EXHIBITION INFORMATION

When we say ephemerality we enter a vast field of existence, because everything that lives it is ultimately consumed. Thus the ephemeral includes pieces of stories, flashes, selected moments, chosen moments.

The ephemeral selects and emphasizes the essential.

By ephemeral we mean everything transitory, temporary, passing or fugitive: a sunrise, the fascinating colors of a special sunset which is completely changed when you look again, a falling leaf, the journey of a snowflake, a moment of pure joy, a smile, a moment with our loved ones, everyone's face transformed over time, a reunion, a separation, every happy or sad moment, all the memories, almost anything you can think of because everything passes, changes and is consumed by time - everything that we are and everything we live is ephemeral.

Moments slip through our fingers second by second...

The ephemeral becomes the tragic of our existence, but it is also what makes us live to the fullest, not to waste time, to add life and value to our days and years. Ballet's Fleeting Moments

Seventh Day

The painting strongly affects emotions, forcing the viewer to reflect. Its symbolism is open to various interpretations, emanating an atmosphere of melancholy, loneliness and introspection, searching for identity. It could be a scene of regret, contemplating something that has been lost. The contrast between the dark background and the light body of the figure emphasizes its fragility and alienation. The use of red contours around the figure suggests intense emotions, internal anxiety, and even physical or mental pain. The presence of a shadow in the mirror adds mystery - is it a reflection of the figure or a symbol of a hidden part of its personality?

A Grandparents Burden

Globally, Grandparents often serve as a surrogate parent for their grandchildren, usually as a response to a family crisis or other sociopolitical issues [e.g. poverty, war, disease, migration.] Grandparents raising grandchildren are primarily responsible for all aspects of their grandchild's care, even when the grandparent themselves have extenuating health issues. This can cause financial burdens and extra health related stress on the Grandparents.

In this picture, I depict the complacency of a child who has yet to realize the abandonment of her father. The grandmother weeps for the life her grandchild is soon to face.





Memories of My Childhood

An increasing number of adults, especially in the United States, are dealing with chronic health conditions or disabilities. Living with a disability can significantly impact mental health. Adults with disabilities report frequent mental distress up to as much as five times more often as those without disabilities. Factors like social isolation, discrimination, and limited access to resources contribute to these challenges. Adults with disabilities are more likely to report depression and anxiety, reduced healthcare access, and health-related risk behaviors than adults without disabilities.

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
