

EXHIBITION INFORMATION

Artists explore the concept of self-portrait without the use of their actual physical image. The underlying theme would be "The Best of Yourself" The work can speak of the artist's whole self or an aspect of their personality, being or personal philosophy. It cannot in any way represent their physical being or any part of the body. Part of the submission would be what they write about the work which would be published alongside the work.

For example, Unencumbered, shown below, is a self portrait because of its meaning. I did not create it as a self portrait, but when I was explaining the process of it's creation to a collector, it was reflected back to me that it was indeed a portrait of myself, my best self, my strongest self... the person I actually am rather that what I look like.




MAIS OUI, DANCEZ!




ISLAND

THROUGH MYSELF




LOAF OF BREAD
